OBSERVATIONS:

Based on the exit survey, it was seen that more than 85% of the class felt that the course had familiarised them with the basic concepts of sociology. Above 90% students felt that the course has helped to generate further insight into the discipline.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:



OBSERVATIONS:

Based on the Exit survey conducted for the paper on Sociology of India it was found that the majority of the class found the classroom interactions productive ,with only 7 % being neutral, and except for 2% they were able to understand the basic concepts and their application to the understanding of Indian society .Only 2% of the students were neutral about the same.


ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:

OBSERVATIONS:

Through the course exit survey, it can be seen that most of the students were able to understand the main components of the paper and achieve the learning outcomes. However, an average of 8.9% of students were either neutral/strongly disagreed that they learnt about ethical and practical issues of research. An average of 1.8% strongly disagreed that they could differentiate between qualitative and quantitative methods. An average of 10.7% of students were neutral/disagreed/strongly disagreed that the course enhanced their understanding of basic concepts of research to developing a research design. An average of 10.7% of students were neutral/disagreed that they realised that research methods are not culture-specific but universal in nature.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT

Based on the results of the survey, several steps will be taken to solve the problem -


- Students will be provided additional secondary readings and study material to help them to comprehend the primary readings.

OBSERVATIONS:

Above 80% of students felt that the course had exposed them to sociological imagination and helped in understanding ideas as groups, community, norms, institutions etc. More than 70% students stated the course familiarised them with the basic concepts of Sociology and prepared them for further engagement with the course. However, there were some percentage students who were neutral in their response and unclear on the various aspects of the course. A miniscule number of students were not satisfied with the course in helping to understand the basic concepts, equip them with steps to do research and prepare them for future engagement with the discipline of Sociology.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:






Question 1.Does the course teach you about basic life skills? 48 responses




Question 2.Does the Course make you think about yourself and your beliefs?





A small percentage felt that the practical component did not support the theoretical part of the paper


ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:

OBSERVATIONS:

Most of the students felt that the course allowed them to explore cultural dimensions of their lives and cultivate ethical values to create a better society. Students also felt that they are able to revisit their assumptions and beliefs and become mindful of their thoughts. Majority of them agreed that the course helps them cultivate ethical values and participate in the creation of a better society. A miniscule number however, were unclear whether the classroom is an interactive space where they can express themselves.

OBSERVATIONS:

Above 90% of the students felt that the course enabled them to understand approaches and ideas in scholarship of India. More than 85% were in agreement that the course has acquainted them with the problems and challenges of nation-building and enabled them to understand the idea of the nation as put in the Indian Constitution. Again, above 80% students stated the course made them familiar with diverse public imaginations of India as emerging in the formative year. A little above 70% of the students felt that the course exposed them to the complexity of the idea of India and its multiple layers. However, there were a small percentage of the students who were neutral in their response, and expressed being unsure on various aspects related to the course.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:

Based on the students feedback greater interaction will be made in class explaining to students, India's complexity as it manifests multiple ideas, ideologies and differences. As innovative pedagogy more films and documentaries reflecting on the ideas and perceptions of national leaders like Gandhi, Ambedkar, Nehru and Savarkar will be screened. Youtube links on the same will also be provided to the students. Further, the students will be encouraged to engage in classroom discussions to understand how the Constitution of India


would have emerged following the views and perceptions of the nationalist leaders incorporating the idea of understanding and respecting diversity and differences.

OBSERVATIONS:

Based on the Course Exit Survey it was found that 80% of the students were able to understand the conceptual tools for sociological analysis of the political phenomena. About 70% agreed, while 6.7% of students disagreed and strongly disagreed, and 22.2% were

neutral that the course locates fundamental questions of politics and power in the global transformation through the engagement of society, state and democracy . An average of 6.7% of students disagreed that the course outlined the classical and contemporary sociological analysis for political institutions and processes. An average of 17.8 % of students were neutral that the course discusses the interface between politics and society both theoretically and empirically.

Based on the results of the survey, several steps were taken to solve the problem -



Through the Course Exit Survey it was found that most students were able to understand the major themes and topics of the paper. OBSERVATIONS

The survey result reveals that nearly 83% of the students strongly agree/ agree with the the most important learning outcome of the paper that health and illness are affected by social, cultural and political factors along with biological ones.

Nearly 97% of the students are able to identify the major ideological perspectives and debates that are taught in the course. 83% of the students are able to apply the concepts to the practice of medicine.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:








Did you feel the readings are sufficient to understand the course? ^{29 responses}

OBSERVATIONS:

Based on the survey responses, the majority of students (around 90%) felt they were able to understand the basic concepts of Indian society after completing the course. Similarly, most students (86%) agreed the course helped them gain insights into Indian society. In regards to communication, 79% of students responded that they were able to understand different types of communication after taking the course. This indicates the course was reasonably effective in covering concepts related to communication. Most students (72%) felt the course readings were sufficient to understand the material. However, over a quarter of students did not feel the readings were adequate. This suggests the need to evaluate the course readings and supplement with additional materials where needed. An area needing improvement is stimulating further interest in the course material. Only 62% of students said they were able to generate additional interest in the course topics. More interactive and engaging teaching methods may help increase student motivation. Attendance records show most students (83%) attended over 75% of classes. This indicates students were actively participating in a majority of lectures and course activities.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:

Based on student feedback and attendance data, the following actions will be implemented:

- Review course readings and add supplemental materials where needed to provide greater coverage of course concepts.
- Incorporate more interactive teaching methods such as discussions, debates, group work, and hands-on activities to stimulate further interest in course topics.

- Identify engaging readings, documentaries, guest speakers, and field visits that connect course concepts to real-world examples and current events.
- Maintain an attendance policy that encourages students to actively participate in lectures and activities. Consider ways to further improve attendance where possible.
- · Survey students regularly throughout the course to gauge interest levels and solicit feedback for improvements.
- Meet with students performing poorly on assessments to identify gaps and provide additional support.

While the course is generally effective, enhancements to readings, teaching methods, real-world connections, and student engagement/participation should help strengthen student outcomes.



It is observed from the exit survey that 3% felt the course does not familiarise then with the relation between society and nature and 3.5% felt that the course does not enable applicability to public policy. Further 7 % felt that they were not equipped to engage in problem solving, while 6 % felt that they were not equipped to handle questions on environmental justice.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:

Based on the above survey the action that will be taken will be focused on engaging students in more classroom discussion aimed at public policy implementation as well as application of their theoretical understanding in empirical situations by making the students engage in project work and engage with industry

They will also be encouraged to work with environmental justice organisations to gain hands-on experience of problem solving at the societal level.








2. The course provided you an understanding of work in global dimension.




- 3. The course has made you sensitive to complexities and inequalities in the area of work.



OBSERVATIONS:

Above 95% students felt that the course had familiarised them with the concept of work from a sociological lens. They felt that the course had exposed them to the global and socio-historical dimensions of work. Again they pointed out that the course had also helped them to understand complexities, inequalities and contemporary issues in the area of work and industry.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:

Based on the students feedback further efforts would be made to sensitise them on the concept of work in its various dimensions by organising interactive discussions in the classroom and engaging them in projects. Also, students will be further encouraged to attend talks and participate in conferences on themes related to work and industry. In addition, regular tests and assignments will be given and remedial classes will be organised.
