Action to be Taken Report:








Action to be taken: based on the feedback, 3.1 percent felt that the course does not provide historical, socio cultural perspectives of understanding marriage and intimacy. Efforts will be made through discussions on inter-caste marriage, objection to same-sex love, What happens to families when they migrate? etc, to provide relevance to what they are studying. To use more class based activity to make students understand different cultures: marriage (legal contract, spiritual bond, social duty), Choose partners (love vs arranged). Raise children (communal vs

individual parenting) and use group group activity to contrast Indian, Western, and Indigenous perspectives, to help recognize cultural variation and social construction.







Observations: Based on the observations the course is able to help students (85%) understand the basic concepts of Families and intimacy.



Observations:

Above 90 percent of students agreed that the course had familiarised them with the concept of structured inequalities, principal theories and critical debates pertaining on social stratification. Action to be Taken Report:



Action to be Taken Report:



Action to be Taken Report:



Action To Be Taken Report:



Action to be Taken Report:



Action to be Taken Report:












Observations and Action to be taken:

9.5% of the students expressed that the course did not help them understand the historical and organic linkages between Indian tribes and Indian civilization. A detailed review of the syllabus and reading materials will be made to ensure that the historical and socio-cultural linkages of Indian tribes with broader Indian civilization are more explicitly integrated. to introduce More contextual case studies, ethnographic examples, and historical narratives will be introduced to make these connections clearer and more relatable for students. Interactive teaching methods (such as documentary screenings, field-based assignments, and discussions on tribal contributions to Indian culture) will be explored to enhance conceptual understanding.

A feedback session or tutorial and extra classes will be organized to revisit this theme midsemester, ensuring that any conceptual gaps are addressed during the course itself. 2. Course equipe you to analyse the formation of diverse identities of tribal cultures in Indian civilisation.




Observations: A large portion of students felt the course has limited clarity or depth in understanding how tribal identities have historically evolved and interacted with Indian civilisation.

Action to be taken: To enhance clarity, focus on theoretical frameworks such as indigeneity, cultural assimilation, resistance, and identity politics, will be made to support analytical depth. Efforts will be made to include aspects of region-specific case studies (e.g., Gonds, Santals, Bhils, Nagas) and historical processes (e.g., colonial ethnography, forest rights, state integration) that shape identity formation. Students will be encouraged to engage in comparative analysis of tribal communities across different cultural and ecological zones to understand diversity. To strengthen analytical skills, assignments will include primary source analyses, field-based reflections, and critical reviews of ethnographic films. Opportunities for dialogue with tribal scholars, activists, or guest speakers will be explored to bring grounded perspectives into the classroom.


3. The course provide an insights of tribal social institutions and their role in promoting the values of justice, co-existence, equality and sustainable living.





Observations: 4.8% of the students strongly disagreed that the course adequately helped them understand this outcome.

Action to be Taken: The feedback has been acknowledged and will be used to strengthen the delivery of content relating to tribal social institutions and value systems. Additional emphasis will be placed on tribal customary law, kinship structures, community governance (e.g., village councils, *khap* or *kebang* systems, dzumsa, etc), and ecological knowledge systems that embody these core values. Supplementary readings, films, and oral histories will be introduced to offer real-life examples and cultural narratives from various tribal regions. Classroom discussions will be restructured to include critical reflections on contemporary challenges (e.g., displacement, development, and state policy) affecting the continuity of these institutions and values.



Observations: Based on the feedback, students actively participated in discussions and showed interest in tribal histories, identities, and rights. However, some students found the content of the course indicated difficulty understanding themes like indigeneity, displacement, and legal pluralism. Feedback also suggests more content on tribes from regions for a pan-Indian understanding, and there is a lack of direct field engagement or ethnographic interaction.

Action to be Taken Report: To enhance the teaching and learning of the course efforts will be made to Include introductory modules or visual explainers on key concepts like tribal identity, customary law, and autonomy. Introduce inclusive case studies focusing on tribal groups from underrepresented regions like Rajasthan (Bhil), Tamil Nadu (Toda), and Gujarat (Dhodia), and also to highlight contributions of tribal women, youth movements, and ecological knowledge systems. In future efforts will also be made for students to have practical exposure, virtual ethnographic projects, or interaction with tribal scholars and activists. to integrate optional field assignments or local case documentation projects. Incorporate more documentaries, podcasts, digital archives, and storytelling-based learning methods.



Action to be Taken Report:




Action to be Taken Report:

OBSERVATIONS:

Based on the survey responses, the majority of students (around 90%) felt they were able to understand the basic concepts of Indian society after completing the course. Similarly, most students (86%) agreed the course helped them gain insights into Indian society. In regards to

communication, 79% of students responded that they were able to understand different types of communication after taking the course. This indicates the course was reasonably effective in covering concepts related to communication. Most students (72%) felt the course readings were sufficient to understand the material. However, over a quarter of students did not feel the readings were adequate. This suggests the need to evaluate the course readings and supplement with additional materials where needed. An area needing improvement is stimulating further interest in the course material. Only 62% of students said they were able to generate additional interest in the course topics. More interactive and engaging teaching methods may help increase student motivation. Attendance records show most students (83%) attended over 75% of classes. This indicates students were actively participating in a majority of lectures and course activities.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:

Based on student feedback and attendance data, the following actions will be implemented:

- •Review course readings and add supplemental materials where needed to provide greater coverage of course concepts.
- •Incorporate more interactive teaching methods such as discussions, debates, group work, and hands-on activities to stimulate further interest in course topics.
- •Identify engaging readings, documentaries, guest speakers, and field visits that connect course concepts to real-world examples and current events.


In future students will be further encouraged to reflect on theoretical discussion related to the human body and its relation to inequality in everyday context by giving them more application oriented projects. More discussions will be made in the classroom connecting theoretical debates and perspectives to real life instances. Documentaries will be screened relating to key axes of different body types and stances related to them in order to enhance their understanding on the subject. Students will be encouraged to attend seminars and conferences pertaining to the subject







OBSERVATIONS:

Above 80% students were of the opinion that the course had helped them understand social policy as an object of sociological investigation and familiarised them with key theories and concepts related to it. They expressed that course reflected the inter-disciplinary nature of social policy and explained the dynamics involved in policy making process. The also pointed that the course had familiarised them with the social policy framework and its evolution in Indian context. Around 75.8% students pointed the course had rendered them with analytical skills to evaluate and improve social policy.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:

Based on the survey conducted, more efforts will be made to engage students in project works to critically review contemporary social policies and classroom discussions will be held to enhance their analytical skills to critically evaluate the same. Students will be further engaged in activities like rewriting a policy framework suggesting scope for change and improvement. More assignments, tests and quizzes shall be given to expand students understanding of the course. Remedial classes will be conducted for weak students.






1. Does the course help you understand Museum as a resource center?*


2. Were you able to understand the historical process of Institutionalization of Archeology and culture through museum?




Did the course help you understand the various role of museum an organizer, preserver and manager of artefacts as well as dissemination of knowledge and information?


