
The English Department Association in collaboration with Electoral Literacy Club of Janki Devi Memorial College conducted a lecture on the topic 'Simultaneous Elections in India: A critical analysis of feasibility, benefits, and concerns' on 12th November 2025 from 12:15 pm to 1:00 pm. The speaker of the event was Mr. Ahirrao Dinesh Bharat, Assistant Professor from Department of Political Science, Janki Devii Memorial College.

The event commenced with Mr. Samiran Ghissing felicitating Mr. Ahirrao with a sapling as a token of respect and welcome. Mr. Bharat began the lecture by defining the term 'simultaneous elections' and its process. He explained the factors in favour and in against the concept of 'One Nation, One Election'. He emphasised on principles and values of elections which includes; Active Participation, Accountability and Federalism. By giving examples of Aristotle' s and Rousseau's idea of Politics, he links freedom of citizens with active and meaningful participation in elections.

He also referred to several constitutional and policy bodies that have expressed support for simultaneous elections, namely the Law Commission (1999), the Election Commission (2016), and NITI Ayog. He remarked that although frequent elections may lead to certain challenges, they provide the poor an opportunity to participate in politics and strengthen the democratic principles enshrined in the Constitution.

He ended his lecture with a powerful quote "The only solution to the ills of democracy is more democracy." The session concluded with an engaging question and answer round, where students actively raised their queries and discussed various aspects of the topic. Overall, the lecture was highly informative and beneficial for all attendees.


The English Department Association and the Counselling Committee of Janki Devi Memorial College in collaboration with Niyogi Books, organized a panel discussion titled "Mapping Emotional Geographies: Trauma and Transformation in Bandaged Moments" on 7th November 2025 from 11:00 am to 12: 30 pm in the college Seminar Hall.

The event focused on the anthology *Bandaged Moments: Stories of Mental Health by Women Writers* from Indian Languages, published by Niyogi Books and edited by Dr. Nabanita Sengupta and Dr. Nishi Pulugurtha, who also participated as panelists alongside Prof. Swati Pal, Principal of JDMC. The session was moderated by Dr. Sanjukta Naskar.

The discussion explored how narratives of trauma, healing, and resilience are woven through women's writing in Indian languages. The panelists reflected on the intersections of emotional geographies and creative expression, emphasizing the significance of literature as a means of articulating silenced experiences and fostering empathy. Interspersed between the discussions was an engaging audience quiz on mental health facts, with surprise gifts for the winners. Trisha Niyogi of Niyogi Books also announced a *Listening Circle* initiative aimed at creating a support group at Kundan Books, Jorbagh.

The event witnessed enthusiastic participation from faculty members and students alike, who engaged in a lively Q&A session that deepened the conversation around mental health, gender, and storytelling. Overall, the discussion offered valuable insights into the transformative power of literature in mapping the contours of emotional and psychological experience.

# The Narrative of Subversion and Accommodation in the Novels of Jane Austen: A Reading of *Pride* and *Prejudice*

#### Report

The English Department Association, in collaboration with the BA Programme Department of Janki Devi Memorial College, University of Delhi, conducted a lecture titled "The Narrative of Subversion and Accommodation in the Novels of Jane Austen: A Reading of Pride and Prejudice". The lecture was delivered by Prof. B. Mangalam, Department of English, Aryabhatta College, University of Delhi, on Friday, 31 October, at 2:30 PM in the Committee Room.


Prof. Mangalam was welcomed and felicitated by the Principal before taking the stage. She began by addressing the students' initial queries and then structured her talk around those questions. Emphasising that *Pride and Prejudice* is far more than a romantic narrative, she discussed themes of class, money, and gender roles in nineteenth-century England. She highlighted how marriage in the novel becomes a means through which characters negotiate class expectations and financial realities.

Over the next two hours, Prof. Mangalam examined various characters to illustrate issues such as arranged marriage, the impact of patriarchy on both men and women, entailment, and the Bennet family's dynamics. She noted the central role of money in shaping relationships and explained how marriage often functioned as an economic arrangement. She also analysed Elizabeth and Darcy's relationship as one marked by social difference and moral growth, discussed Lydia and Wickham's elopement as an exposure of class and moral norms, and described Charlotte Lucas as a pragmatic opportunist.

In her concluding remarks, Prof. Mangalam responded to the criticism that Austen ignored major political events, arguing that Austen offers a subtle, feminine perspective on war and its social consequences. After the lecture, she encouraged students to continue asking questions and shared reading strategies, especially for the first-year students.

The audience participated actively, raising thoughtful questions about characters, plot developments, and historical context.


The English Department Association organised a screening of *Sonar Kella* (*The Golden Fortress*) on 31 October 2025 from 12:00 noon to 2:30 PM in Room 13.

The aim of the event was to introduce students to regional Indian cinema and help them understand how storytelling in films connects with literature. The screening also offered an opportunity to learn about Satyajit Ray—one of India's finest filmmakers—and his distinct style of simple yet powerful storytelling. Such viewings encourage students to observe how themes are presented visually and how culture shapes cinematic expression.

Sonar Kella, directed by Satyajit Ray, follows a young boy named Mukul, who recalls fragments of a past life in a golden fortress. His unusual memories lead detective Feluda and his cousin Topshe on an adventurous journey through Rajasthan to uncover the truth. The film blends mystery, travel, and humour, showcasing Ray's mastery of narrative and detail. Around 15 students attended the screening, along with a few faculty members from the English Department

The screening encouraged students to appreciate the depth and creativity of regional cinema. Overall, it was a simple yet enriching experience that enhanced their understanding of film, literature, and Indian cultural narratives.


The event titled "Bystander Assistance for Social Inclusion" was held at Janki Devi Memorial College, University of Delhi on 29 October 2025 in Room no 66 under the aegis of the IQAC. Organized by the Centre for Study of Disability Inclusion in collaboration with the Department of English. The event was inaugurated by Dr. Md. Zubeer Ahmed, served as a resource person for the event. The focus was on supporting persons with visual impairment, those who are hard of hearing, and those with locomotor disabilities.

The session emphasized the correct social protocols and terminology to be used when interacting with persons with disabilities (PwDs), aiming to foster a respectful and inclusive environment. Md. Zubeer Ahmed echoed his sentiments. Key points discussed included avoiding outdated and inappropriate terminology, such as "invalid" or "handicapped," and instead focusing on respectful language that upholds the dignity of PwDs.

The event also provided specific guidelines for assisting persons with visual impairments, hearing impairments, and locomotor disabilities. Participants were educated on the importance of appropriate interaction, such as maintaining eye contact, avoiding unnecessary physical contact with assistive devices like wheelchairs, and being mindful of the surroundings that could pose hazards to PwDs. Apoorva Roy, the President of Saksham Students' Union, demonstrated Indian Sign Language (ISL), covering the alphabets, numbers and some basic words and phrases. Students enjoyed the session and took part in the ISL demo. It showed how small actions can make communication more inclusive.

Overall, the event highlighted the vital role of bystanders in advocating for accessible public spaces and promoting inclusivity. It encouraged participants to become active bystanders who not only assist but also educate others about the importance of social inclusion for persons

#### Report

The English Department Association of Janki Devi Memorial College, organized a Foundation Lecture on "Essentials of Writing: Beginner's Level" by Mr. Anuj Kumar, Assistant Professor in the English Department Association, JDMC, on 15th October 2025 from 12:00 PM to 1:00 PM in Room No. 13.


Mr. Kumar introduced students to formal, informal and academic writing, explaining their purpose, style and key features. He explained the WH approach for formal writing (Who, What, When, Where, Why, How) with examples like emails, formal whatsapp messages and other official messages. He also emphasized the importance of tone, clarity and structure in professional communication.

The session then covered informal writing, including narratives, descriptive pieces, expository writing, and argumentative writing. Students were given practical tips on sequencing ideas, using details correctly, supporting ideas with examples, and maintaining clarity and relevance to the context.

Academic writing was explained using the CTC method (Context  $\rightarrow$  Text  $\rightarrow$  Criticism). Mr. Kumar demonstrated how to provide context, support it with textual examples, and offer analysis. He also addressed how one can critically analyze a text or idea without being argumentative, focusing on observation, interpretation and explanation rather than taking sides.

Students actively participated by asking questions. Mr. Kumar engaged with the audience throughout, clarifying doubts and providing guidance for improving writing skills.

The lecture concluded with the key takeaway: "Good writing isn't about big words-it's about clear thinking and right expression." The session was informative, interactive, and helped students understand both academic and everyday writing clearly.





The session was held on Zoom, with Mr. Rahul Dutt and Ms. Suchi Aggarwal, representatives of Eduguide Global Consultants, as the guest speakers. Tanmanya, President of the students union of the English Department Association, served as the anchor.

The session began with a formal welcome to the speakers and an introduction to the topic. Mr. Rahul initiated the discussion by outlining key factors to consider while planning higher studies, such as budget, timelines for applications, and variations in requirements across different countries. 


#### Report

The English Department Association of Janki Devi Memorial College organised a lecture under the aegis of IQAC on 27th August 2025. The lecture titled "Lecture on Intellectual Property Rights" was delivered by Prof. Rajashree Chandra, Department of Political Science, Janki Devi Memorial College, University of Delhi.

Prof. Chandra talked about the importance of intellectual property rights in a world of rapid technological advancements and AI innovations. She explained the types of intellectual property rights such as patent, copyright and trademark. Prof. Chandra used simple examples from our daily life to explain concepts like normal property and intellectual property. Her simplified explanations helped maintain student engagement throughout the lecture, including the inquiries that students addressed to her.

Prof. Chandra also pointed out why intellectual property needs a different kind of protection compared to physical property. Her lecture proved to be apprehensible and highly-beneficial for the audience. Around 40 students attended the lecture and many engaged themselves in active participation. The event succeeded in enriching the students' understanding of intellectual property rights, emphasizing the value of originality and teaching them the effective use of these rights.


#### Report

The English Department Association of Janki Devi Memorial College (University of Delhi), organized an insightful lecture on 22nd August 2025, titled "Representation of Caste, Class, and Gender in Modern Indian Writings: Towards Exploring a New Cultural Sociology of Literature". The session was delivered by Dr. Dhurjatti Sarma, Assistant Professor, Department of Modern Indian Languages and Literary Studies, Gauhati University, Assam.

Dr. Sarma spoke on how caste, class and gender intersect in Indian literature, drawing upon preindependence writings, the Bengal Renaissance and reformist voices such as Raja Ram Mohan Roy and Periyar. He analyzed works like Bankim Chandra Chatterjee's *Anandamath* and the spectrum of Munshi Premchand, while also underlining the significance of Dalit literature as articulated by Sharan Kumar Limbale. The lecture emphasized how literature resists social hierarchies and reflects cultural ideologies, blending both Indian and Western thought.

The session witnessed enthusiastic participation, with around 50 students and faculty members engaging in a lively discussion. Students asked thought-provoking questions on themes of resistance, marginality and gender politics, making the session highly interactive. The event successfully deepened critical perspectives on literature as a sociological text and left the audience with fresh insights into the complexities of Indian writing.


#### Report

The English Department Association of Janki Devi Memorial College held a session on "Bharat Jñana Parampara in Research Methodology" by Ms. Swati Sharma, Assistant Professor at Satyawati College, on August 20, 2025, from 12:00 PM to 01:00 PM in the committee room. The Department President, Tanmanya and the Vice President, Srisha, were the anchors for the event.

The session on Bhartiya Jñana in Research Methodology explored the relevance and application of ancient Indian knowledge systems in modern research practices that are rooted in Indian philosophy. Primarily focusing on the Astika and Nastika schools of thought and its fluidity, the speaker emphasised that these philosophies are not rigid or dogmatic. Instead, they offered diverse perspectives on existence, morality, and the nature of reality. The Astika schools emphasised spiritual speculation, ritual practices and the authority of the Vedas. While the Nastika schools stressed empirical evidence, logical reasoning and personal experience.

The session provided valuable insights into the Indian Philosophical schools of thought and their relevance in modern research practices.


#### Report

The English Department Association of Janki Devi Memorial College, University of Delhi, organised a Foundation Lecture on The Greek Epic, delivered by Dr. Jitender Gill, for the first-year students of the English Department on 13 August, 2025 from 12:00 PM to 1:00 PM in the Computer Lab- 1.

Dr. Gill began by examining what defines an epic, particularly within the Western Homeric tradition. Using engaging visual resources, including an ancient map, she guided students through the geographical, cultural, and historical backdrop of the texts they are studying. She explained how, where, and why people travelled in Ancient Graeco-Roman times, laying the foundation for a deeper understanding of Homer's work. The discussion then shifted to Homer's pivotal role in shaping the Western epic, from the conventions he established to the storytelling techniques that remain influential today.

The lecture was supported by association convenors and volunteers, who accompanied Dr. Gill and assisted in facilitating the session. The event concluded with a Q&A, during which Dr. Gill addressed all remaining queries from the audience.


#### Report
