


Talks, Seminars and Conferences by Department of History, 2017-2020

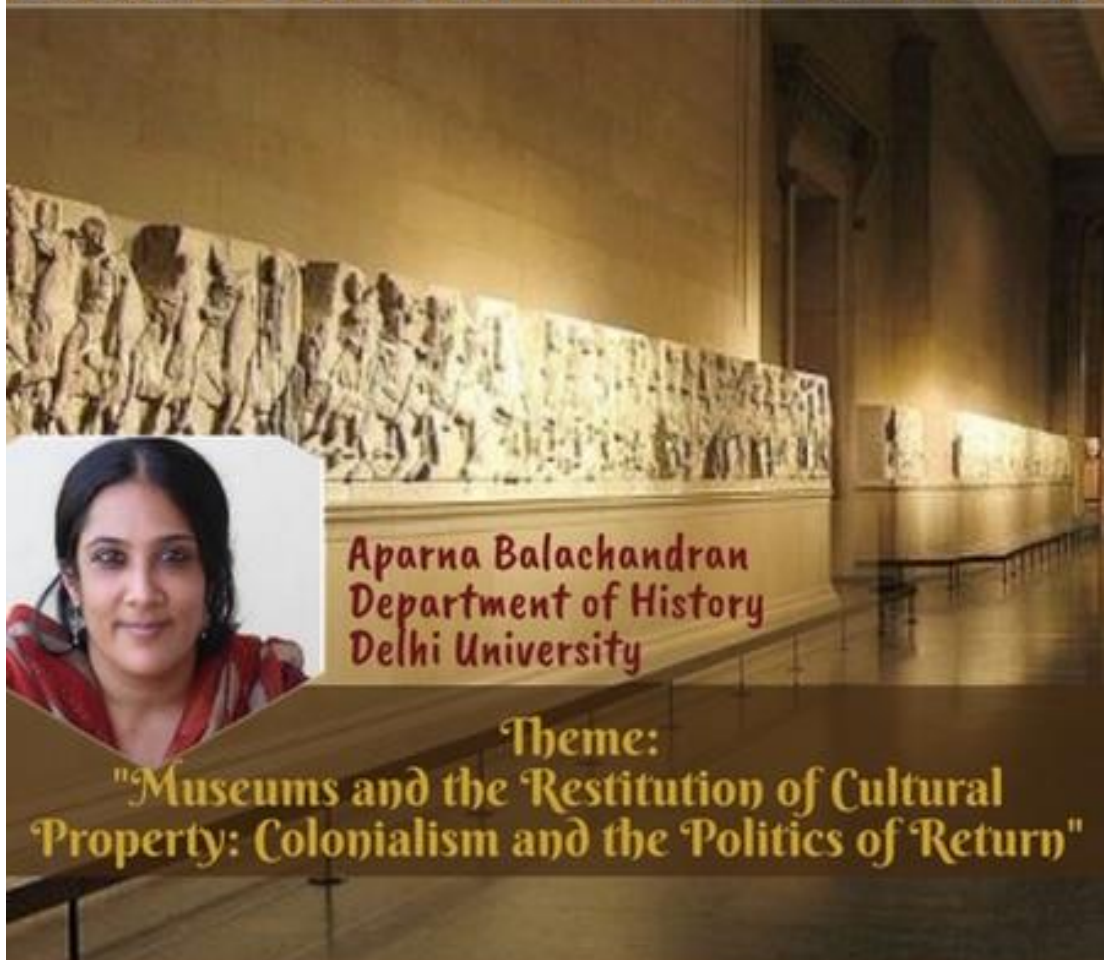

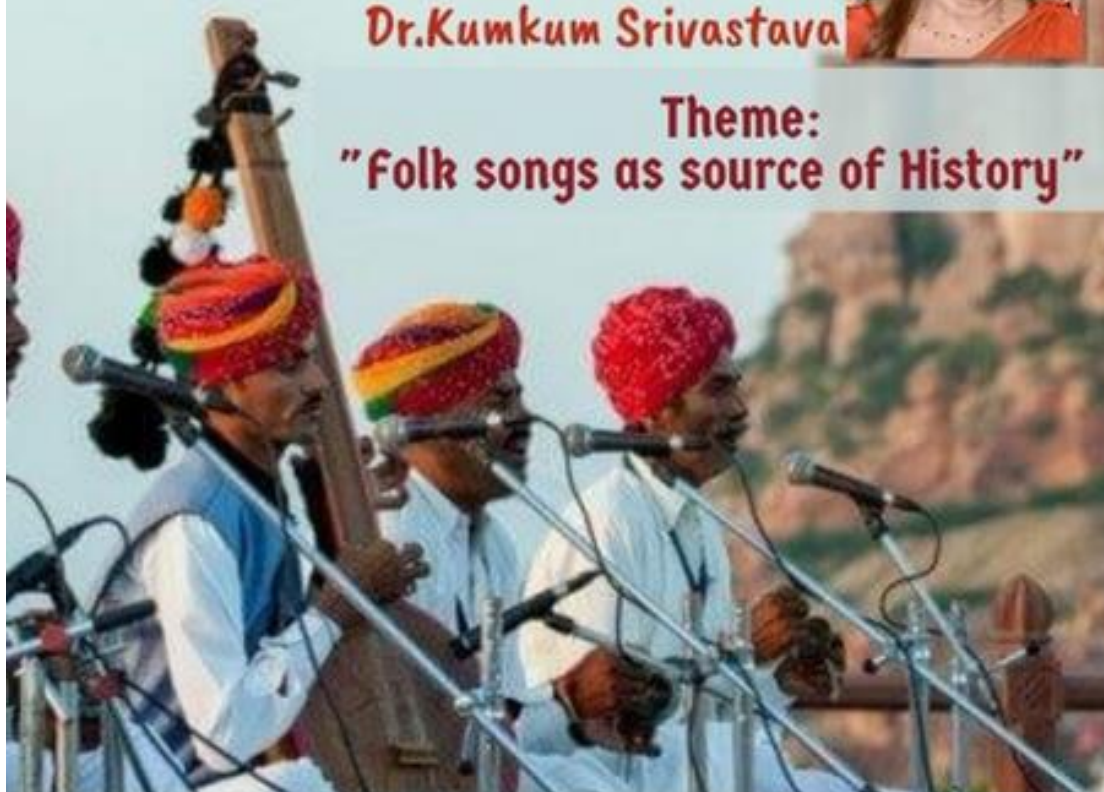

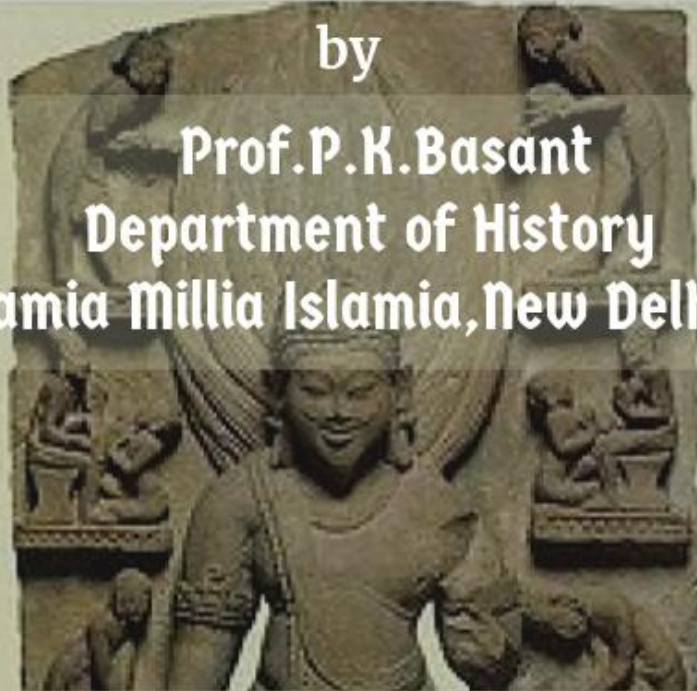

3. Webinar ‘The Past and the Present: Delhi’s two Imperial Cities’ on 14th May, 2020

The Department of History organized a successful Distinguished Speakers webinar on 14th May, 2020, during the lockdown period. Convener of the webinar Dr. Saumya Gupta spoke about how it is fascinating to organise a webinar in the time of the current pandemic and lockdown. Dr. Swati Pal, Principal, Janki Devi Memorial College talked about the deep interest of Shri Brij Krishan Chandiwalla, the founder of the college, in Delhi and its history. The panellists were renowned historians Rana Safvi and Swapna Liddle. Both delivered enthralling lectures on the history of Delhi from Medieval to Colonial period. Rana Safvi commenced her presentation with defining the term 'city'. When talking about Shahjahanabad, she said it had both the aforementioned attributes; plus, it was situated on the banks of a river; and the country's ruler used to reside there as well. Swapna Liddle started her presentation while talking about how New Delhi is about how Old Delhi is perceived. Shahjahanabad, according to her, has a spiritual and temporal aura of empires that ruled there. She talked about the political agendas of the British in making New Delhi as their capital. The webinar was attended by over 200 people and had an extremely interactive Question and Answers session.

5. Talk by Professor Syed Ali Nadeem Rezavi, 13th February, 2020

On 13th February, 2020, Heritage, the History Association of Janki Devi Memorial College, organized a talk on 'Making of a School of Architecture: Akbar and Fatehpur Sikri' by Professor Syed Ali Nadeem Rezavi. The President of the History Association, Himanshi Garg, welcomed everyone and the Principal, Dr. Swati Pal, felicitated Professor Rezavi with a potted plant. In her address, she confessed that she finds Fatehpur Sikri more interesting than the Taj Mahal, though the latter has its own significance and beauty.

Prof. Rezavi, who has extensively worked on Mughal architecture, began by saying that the study of people was more important than measurements in architecture. He pointed out that unlike Europe, in India, secular implied 'tolerance for other religions'. In architecture, Akbar tried to borrow religious icons from different religions though it is imperative to not give a religious dimension to it. According to Prof. Rezavi there is no single feature of architecture that is Mughal, rather, Mughal architecture is an amalgamation of various architectural styles of various traditions. Prof Rezavi also spoke at length about the town planning and architecture of Fatehpur Sikri and its decline. The scarcity of water argument is a myth and it was only abandoned as an imperial capital for political reasons. Lastly, in Prof. Rezavi's words "Fatehpur Sikri is a microscope through which we can understand and decipher Mughal architecture"

7. 'Gandhi in His Times and Ours', 4th October, 2019

'Gandhi in His Times and Ours', organized on 4th of October, 2019 was a daylong seminar under Janki Devi Memorial College's Distinguished Speaker Series. The seminar was organized by the History Department and Gandhi Study Circle of Janki Devi Memorial College.

The seminar consisted of four panelists from a variety of academic disciplines. Professor Alok Rai, Professor Shahid Amin, Dr. Nishikant Kolge and Dr. Rinku. The keynote speaker for the seminar was Prof. Sudhir Chandra a renowned historian and scholar. Seminar commenced with planting of saplings by Professor Sudhir Chandra, Alok Rai and Shahid Amin. Thereafter, Dr. Saumya Gupta addressed the gathering on behalf of the Gandhi Study Circle. Dr. Saumya gave a prolific start to the seminar by giving an introduction on the importance of Gandhi in present times. She spoke about how Gandhi needs to be remembered and debated and most importantly how the present solicits a need to engage with Gandhi and his philosophy of truth in days of fake news. Dr. Swati pal, principal, Janki Devi Memorial College also addressed the gathering and spoke about the importance of Gandhian philosophy in the foundation of Janki Devi Memorial college. The Teachers In charge Natasha Nongbri then addressed the gathering on behalf of the History Department and introduced the keynote speaker.

Professor Sudhir Chandra gave an enthralling keynote speech at the occasion where he spoke about the importance of mother tongue and the importance of Gandhi in the present times, whether it be with reference to the crisis of non- violence or the crisis of environment. The keynote speaker was so well received that the jam packed hall echoed with a long round of applause in response to the address by Prof. Chandra.

After a break for tea, the session opened with the talk of Professor Alok Rai, who spoke about the idea of Hindustan and how it became a Hindi land. He referred to Gandhi with reference to his propagation of Hindustani over Hindi Language. The next in line of the distinguished speakers was Professor Shahid Amin who spoke about Gandhi in the context of his close relations with the peasants. He touched upon interesting anecdotes and testimonies of peasants from Champaran etc.

The post lunch session was chaired by Dr. Saumya Gupta who introduced the last two distinguished speakers, Dr. Nishikant Kolge and Dr. RinkuLamba. Dr. Nishikant Kolge delivered his talk on an important aspect of Gandhi that is,'his practical consideration was as important as his moral and philosophical considerations'. He made his point through Gandhi's idea of non violence and how it was used as a strategy by him many times. Dr. Rinku Lamba spoke on a rather interesting and new aspect of Gandhi's understanding of religion and politics through the prism of Kabir and the Bhakti movement. The program ended with a vote of thanks by Dr. Sandhya Garg, member of the Distinguished Lecture Series Committee and Dr. Manisha Agnihotri on behalf History Department, JDMC.

1. NATIONAL SYMPOSIUM ON POPULAR CULTURE HELD (FEBRUARY 28TH& MARCH 1ST 2019)

A National Symposium on Popular Culture was organized for the benefit of BA Hons and BA Programme students as popular culture forms part of their syllabi.

Another rationale for the Symposium was that Popular Culture has wide mass appeal, being the aggregation of a myriad cultural phenomena such as literature, art, music, dance, theatre, customs, traditions, rituals, food, fashion, film, television, radio and cyber culture.

This symposium tried to explore these themes, sometimes from perspectives of their regional, ethnic and religious variations.

The chief guest for this symposium was the HOD, Dept of Buddhist Studies, Prof K.T.S Sarao who delivered the keynote address. His address mainly focussed on the Jataka tales/fables of Gautam Buddha, his former incarnations at times like an animal, a bird and sometimes like a human being. These tales symbolised the innate values of morality, honesty, self-sacrifice and other moral values which are necessary to become good human beings.

Other key speakers were Prof S.K Rai and Prof P.PDhar from DU, Prof F. Nasreen from JMI, Prof B. Prakash, Dr G. Ghosh from JNU and Dr Jitender Gill and Dr Saumya Gupta from our college.

Cultural programmes marked the close of both days' presentations and deliberations. The first day featured melodious solo and group regional songs and beautiful dance recitals by students. The second day's academic session ended with soulful renditions of Baulsangeet.



2. TATHASTU THE HISTORY DEPARTMENT FESTIVAL - 26 & 27 OCT 2018

The theme of History Festival-Tathastu held in Oct 2018 was "Dilli-6". The inauguration of the Fest was on 26th Oct which began with a National Seminar on "Revisiting Dilli-6". A galaxy of noted historians and scholars like Prof Nadeem Rezavi (Aligarh Muslim University) Prof Najaf Haider (Jawaharlal Nehru University) Prof Farhat Nasreen (Jamia Millia Islamia) and Dr Lubna Irfan enlightened the audience on various aspects of the glorious history of Shahjahanabad which we today sometimes refer to as Dilli-6. In the post-lunch session there were two Inter-College Competitive events like What If and Golgappa Eating Competitions. In the evening,

there was a cultural programme based on the theme Dilli-6. First there was a Ganesh Vandana presented by senior faculty member of the Dept Dr Tara Sheemar, followed by a Kathak Recital by noted Polish exponent Mr Artur Przybylski, who also specializes in Tango, Waltz, Samba, Salsa and Ballroom Dancing. During the Library Festival the History Department organized a talk by Dr T Hussain of the National Archives. He spoke on the evolution of the National Archives and the important phases in its evolution.

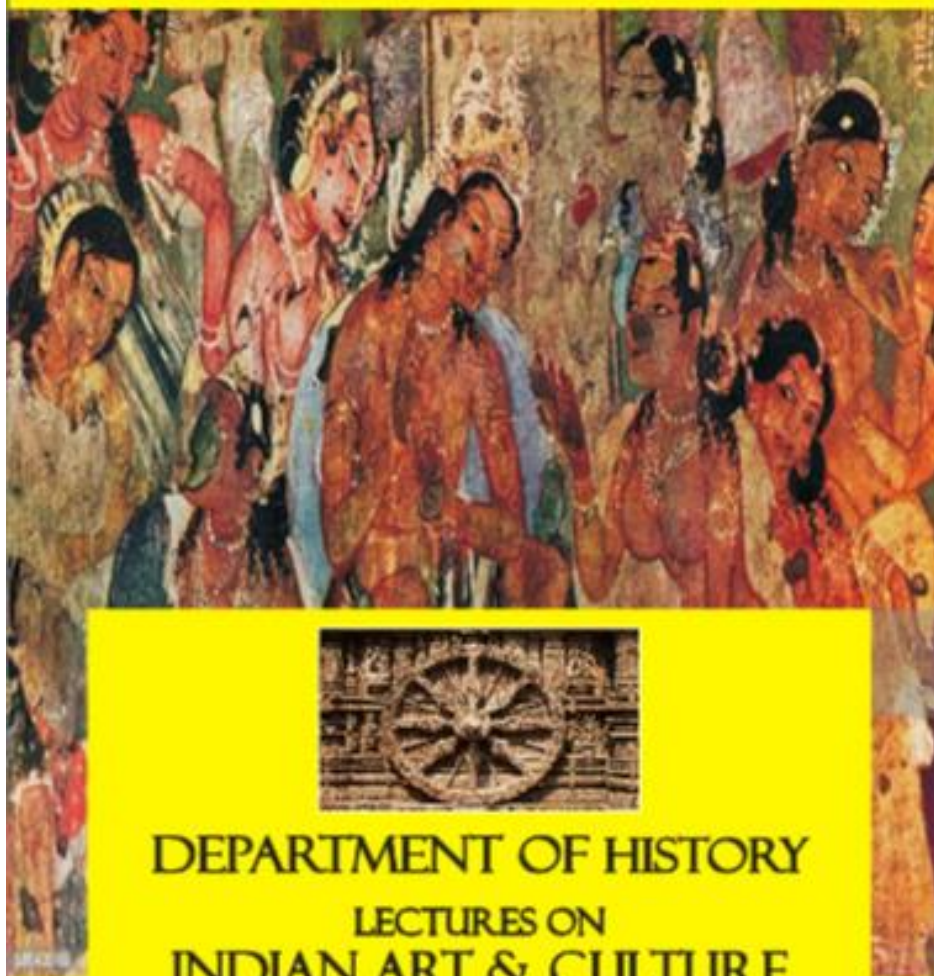

6. Panel Discussion on 'Imaging Gender in the matrix of Power, Love & Hate'

TATHASTU, the History Department's Maiden Festival was held on 27th and 28th October, 2017 which focussed primarily on academics and culture. 7. Vijay Nath Memorial Lecture, 12th October, 2017

HERITAGE, HISTORY ASSOCIATION organized its Dr. Vijay Nath Memorial Lecture Series on the 12th of October 2017 in memory of Late Dr. Vijay Nath. The theme of the lecture series was "Reconstructing Buddha through the prism of 'Tripitakas' and 'Jatakas'."

The speakers were Prof. Hira Paul Gangnegi (Ex-HOD, Dept of Buddhist Studies, DU) and Prof. Hari Shankar Prasad (HOD, Dept of Philosophy, DU). The event was also graced by Late Dr. Vijay Nath's son-in-law Mr. Sai Srinivas. The Principal Dr.

Swati Pal stressed on the need to adopt Buddha's way of living and the relevance of it in present times.

Prof. Gangnegi introduced the students to the complex theme of Reconstructing Buddha. He began with explaining the etymological definition of Buddha itself i.e. wisdom. Prof. Gangnegi highlighted the need to address suffering which Buddha mentioned repeatedly and the essence of which has been captured in the Tripitikas. Boddhi-chitta he stressed is the most important element to be kept in mind.

Prof. Hari Shankar Prasad weaved the philosophy of Buddha from funny anecdotes from his life. He stressed on Buddha's philosophy which requires one to address the problem of cognition through knowledge Vidyacaran. Hence, by questioning everything our existence is reduced to the mind which should be combined with compassion.



8. Talk on Delhi: Cities and Settlements, 2nd of Aug. 2017

The Department of History, Janki Devi Memorial College organized a talk 'Delhi: Cities and Settlements' by Dr. Swapna Liddle on the 2nd of August 2017 at the College Library Hall. Ms. Smita Mitra, Teacher-in-Charge of the Department gave the Inaugural Speech in which she briefly sketched the historical significance of Delhi.

Dr. Liddle spoke on the heritage of Delhi, it's physical landscape and the impact it has had on the cultural and intellectual life through the Ages.
