Performance and Lecture-cum-Demonstration

The Heritage Club organized an enriching Performance and Lecture-cum-Demonstration on 7 May 2024, featuring Prof. Ojesh Pratap Singh, a distinguished exponent of Hindustani classical vocal music and faculty member at the Faculty of Music and Fine Arts, University of Delhi. The session, centred on the theme "Practice and Voice Culture," offered students a rare opportunity to understand the intricate relationship between *riyaz* (practice), breath control, and tonal refinement in classical singing.

Prof. Singh began with an illuminating lecture on the importance of disciplined and consistent practice in developing one's musical identity. He elaborated on various techniques of voice training, emphasizing aspects such as vocal range, clarity, and resonance. The demonstration segment was particularly engaging as he performed short compositions in different ragas to illustrate how voice modulation and tonal precision are achieved through years of practice.

Students and faculty members from the Heritage Club and other disciplines attended the session with great enthusiasm. The interactive discussion that followed allowed participants to ask questions about musical pedagogy, daily practice routines, and the spiritual dimension of Hindustani music. The event successfully bridged aesthetic experience and academic insight, enriching the cultural environment of the college.








Trip to the Red Fort

On April 13, 2024, the Heritage Club organized an enlightening trip to the Red Fort in Delhi, offering members a deeper insight into this iconic historical monument. Heritage Walk


On November 2, 2023, the Heritage Club organized a captivating heritage walk for its members, exploring three of Delhi's most significant historical sites: Purana Qila, Humayun's Tomb, and the Dargah of Hazrat Nizamuddin Auliya. This educational excursion aimed to provide students with a firsthand experience of the city's rich historical and cultural heritage.


The day began with a visit to Purana Qila, one of Delhi's oldest forts. As students wandered through the fort's imposing walls and gates, they learned about its historical significance, including its role as a key site from ancient times to the Mughal Empire. Talk by Prof. Shama Mitra Chenoy
