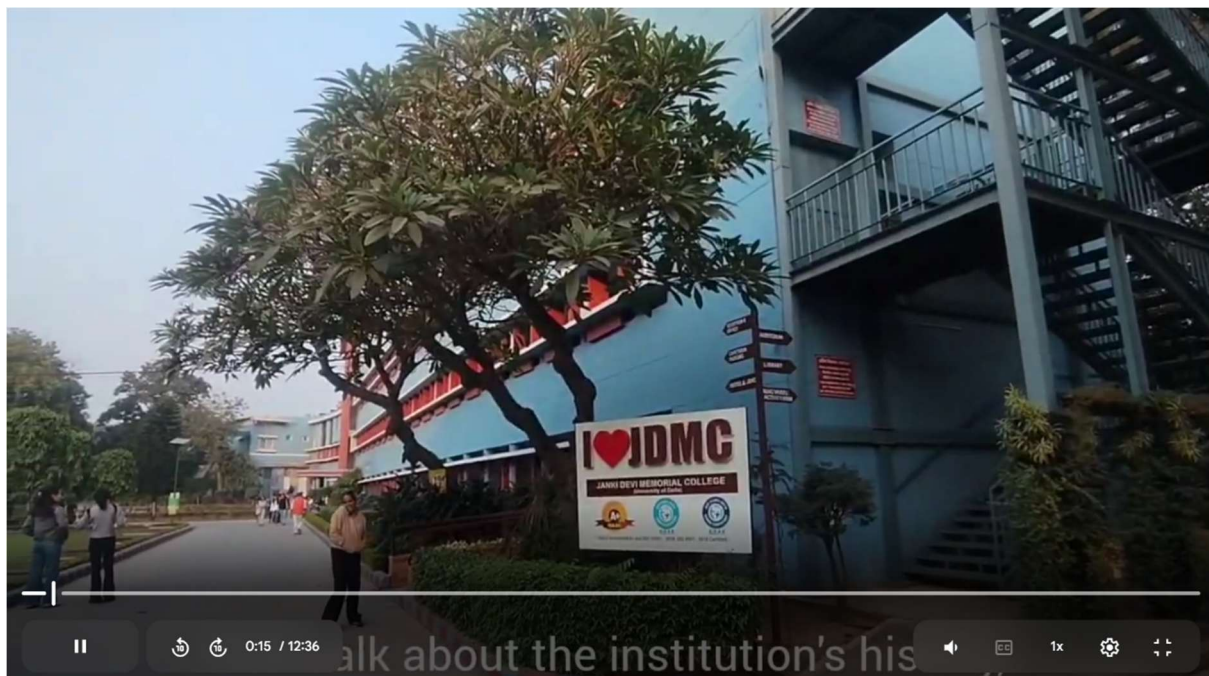
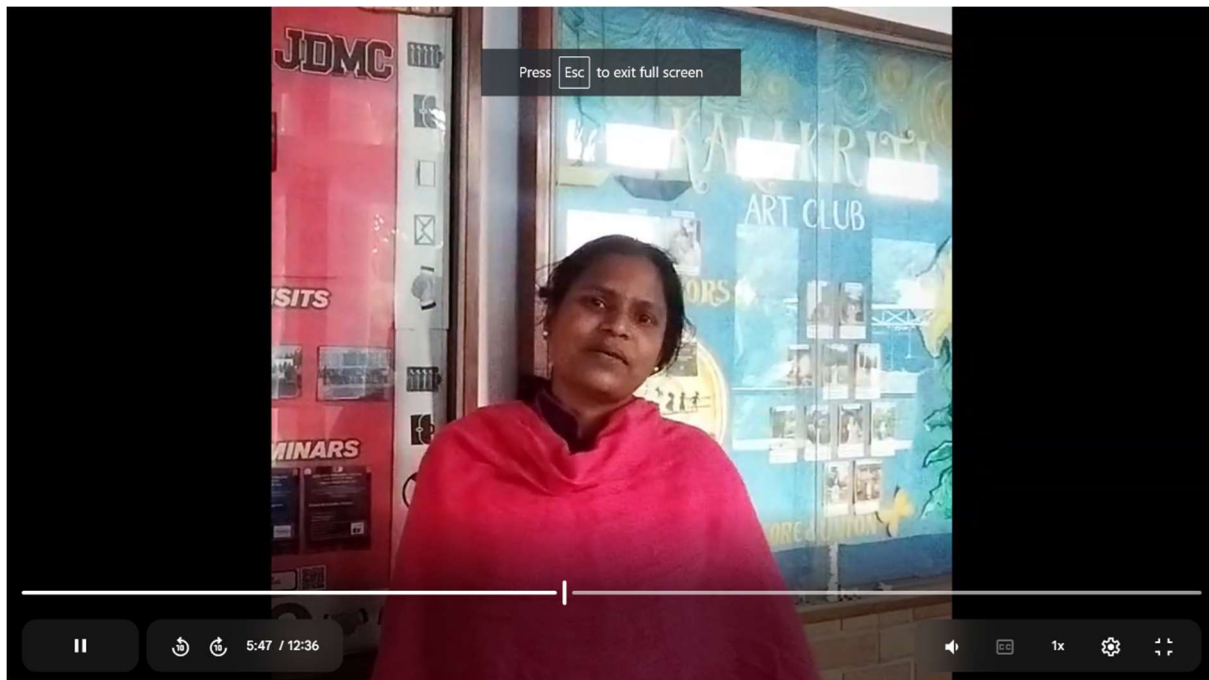


Inter-College Documentary Making Competition on Echoes of Wisdom — The Janki Devi Memorial College Journey, October–November 2025

The Heritage Club organized an Inter-College Documentary Making Competition during October–November 2025 on the theme “Echoes of Wisdom — The Janki Devi Memorial College Journey.” The competition was conceptualized to encourage students to creatively document and interpret the rich legacy, academic ethos, and evolving identity of Janki Devi Memorial College through the medium of documentary filmmaking. Students from various colleges participated enthusiastically, submitting documentaries that explored the institution’s historical milestones, pedagogical traditions, student life, and contributions to women’s education. The entries reflected extensive research, narrative clarity, and innovative visual storytelling, capturing the spirit of the college’s journey from its inception to its present standing.

The competition provided a platform for inter-college interaction and creative engagement, allowing participants to combine historical inquiry with audiovisual skills. Lecture cum Demonstration on The Untold Story of Qawwali, 16th October 2025

The Heritage Club organized a lecture-cum-demonstration on 16 October 2025 on the theme “The Untold Story of Qawwali,” with the objective of familiarizing students with the historical, cultural, and spiritual dimensions of this rich musical tradition. The programme offered an engaging blend of academic discourse and live musical demonstration, attracting enthusiastic participation from students and faculty members. The lecture was delivered by the renowned Sufi Kathak artist Manjari Chaturvedi, who provided a nuanced historical overview of Qawwali as a devotional art form rooted in the Sufi tradition of the Indian subcontinent. She traced its origins to the Chishti Sufi order and discussed how poetry, rhythm, and performance evolved as mediums of spiritual expression and social communication. The lecture highlighted the syncretic nature of Qawwali, emphasizing its role in fostering cultural dialogue and shared heritage across communities.

Following the lecture, a captivating Qawwali demonstration was presented by Hasnain Nizami of the illustrious Qawwal Bachche Gharana, the lineage traditionally associated with the dargah of Hazrat Nizamuddin Auliya. The live performance brought to life the theoretical aspects discussed during the lecture, allowing students to experience the emotive power, lyrical depth, and improvisational richness of Qawwali. The demonstration showcased traditional compositions and explained the structure of Qawwali performances, including the role of call-and-response and rhythmic progression. The interactive session that followed encouraged students to engage with questions related to music, spirituality, and cultural continuity. Overall, the lecture-cum-demonstration proved to be an enriching experience, deepening students’ understanding of India’s intangible cultural heritage and reinforcing the importance of preserving traditional art forms through informed appreciation and academic engagement.



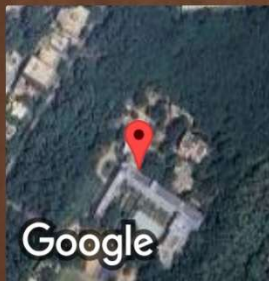

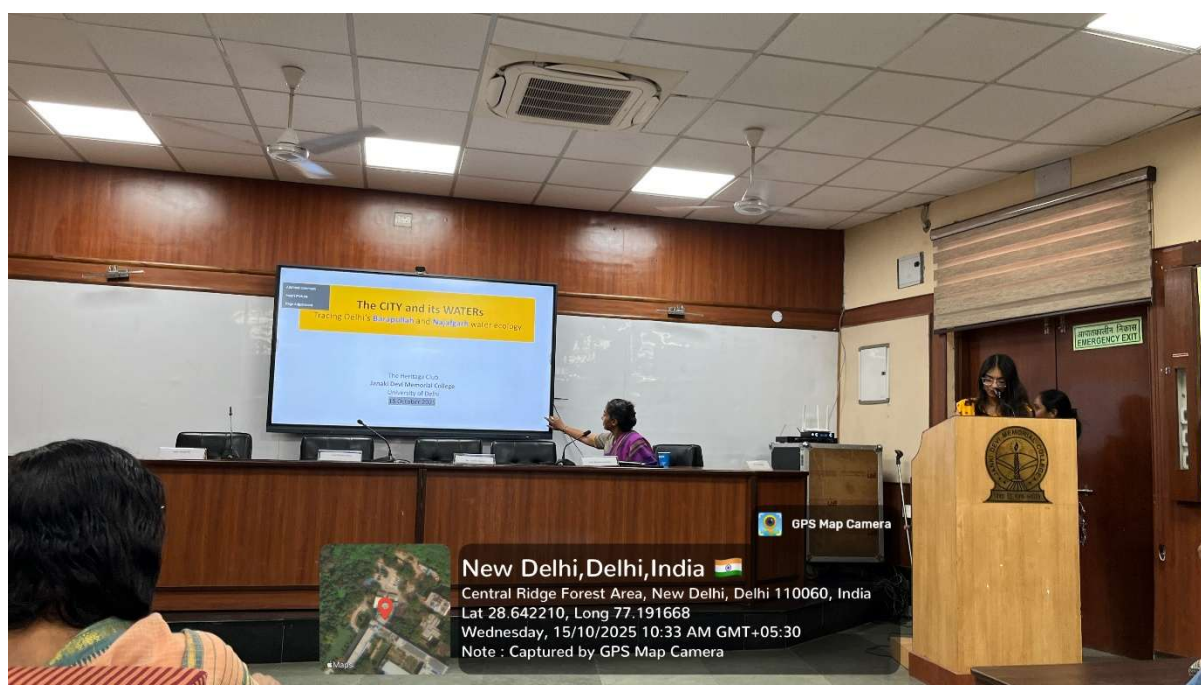
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Lecture and Prize Distribution Ceremony, 15th October 2025

The Heritage Club organized a lecture on 15 October 2025 on the theme “Eco-Heritage of Delhi,” aimed at fostering awareness about the city’s environmental history and sustainable urban practices. The lecture was delivered by Architect and Urbanist Ms. Vandini Mehta on the topic “The City and its Waters: Tracing Delhi’s Barapullah and Najafgarh Water Ecology.” The event witnessed enthusiastic participation from students and faculty members. In her insightful lecture, Ms. Mehta explored the historical evolution and ecological significance of Delhi’s water systems, with particular focus on the Barapullah drain and the Najafgarh basin. She traced how traditional water management practices, natural drainage channels, and wetlands once played a crucial role in sustaining the city’s ecology. The lecture highlighted the impact of rapid urbanization on these water bodies and emphasized the urgent need to integrate ecological thinking into contemporary urban planning. Through visual presentations and case studies, the speaker encouraged students to rethink the relationship between cities and their natural water systems.

The lecture was followed by the Prize Distribution Ceremony for the Inter-College Documentary Making Competition organized by the Heritage Club in September 2025 on the theme “Eco-Heritage of Delhi.” The competition had received active participation from students across various colleges, showcasing creative interpretations of Delhi’s ecological and heritage landscapes. The winners were felicitated with cash prizes of ₹5,000 for the First Prize, ₹3,000 for the Second Prize, and ₹2,000 for the Third Prize. The award ceremony acknowledged the students’ efforts in promoting environmental awareness through visual storytelling. 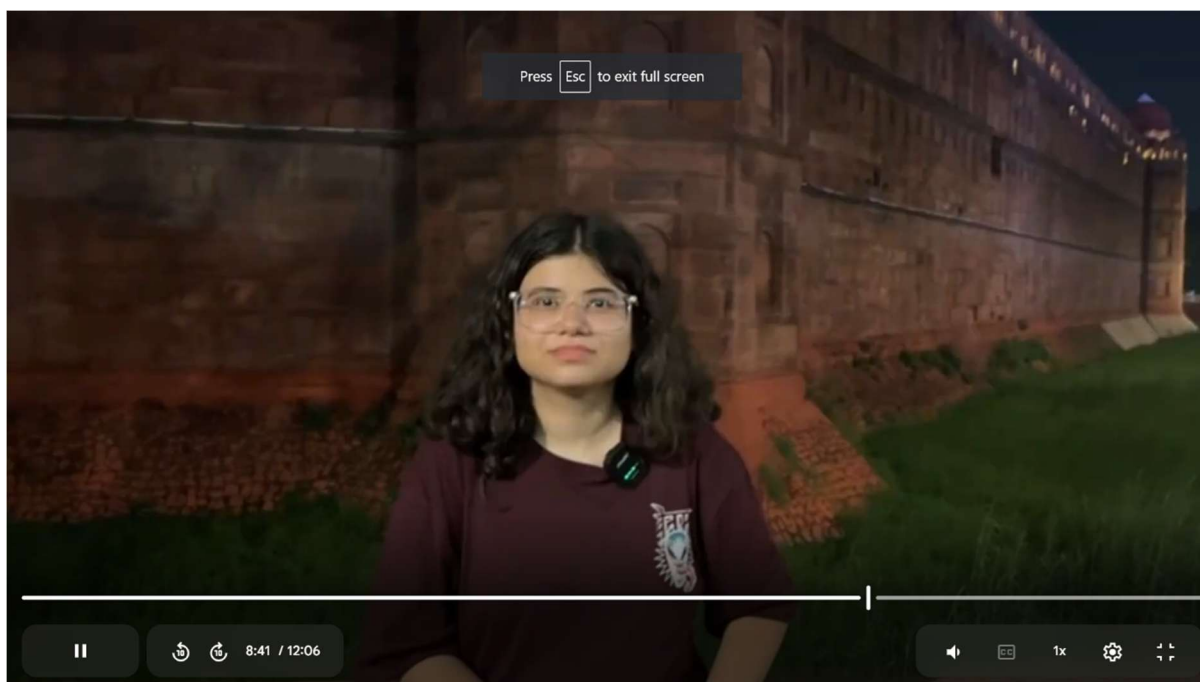




Inter-College Documentary Making Competition on Eco-Heritage of Delhi, September 2025

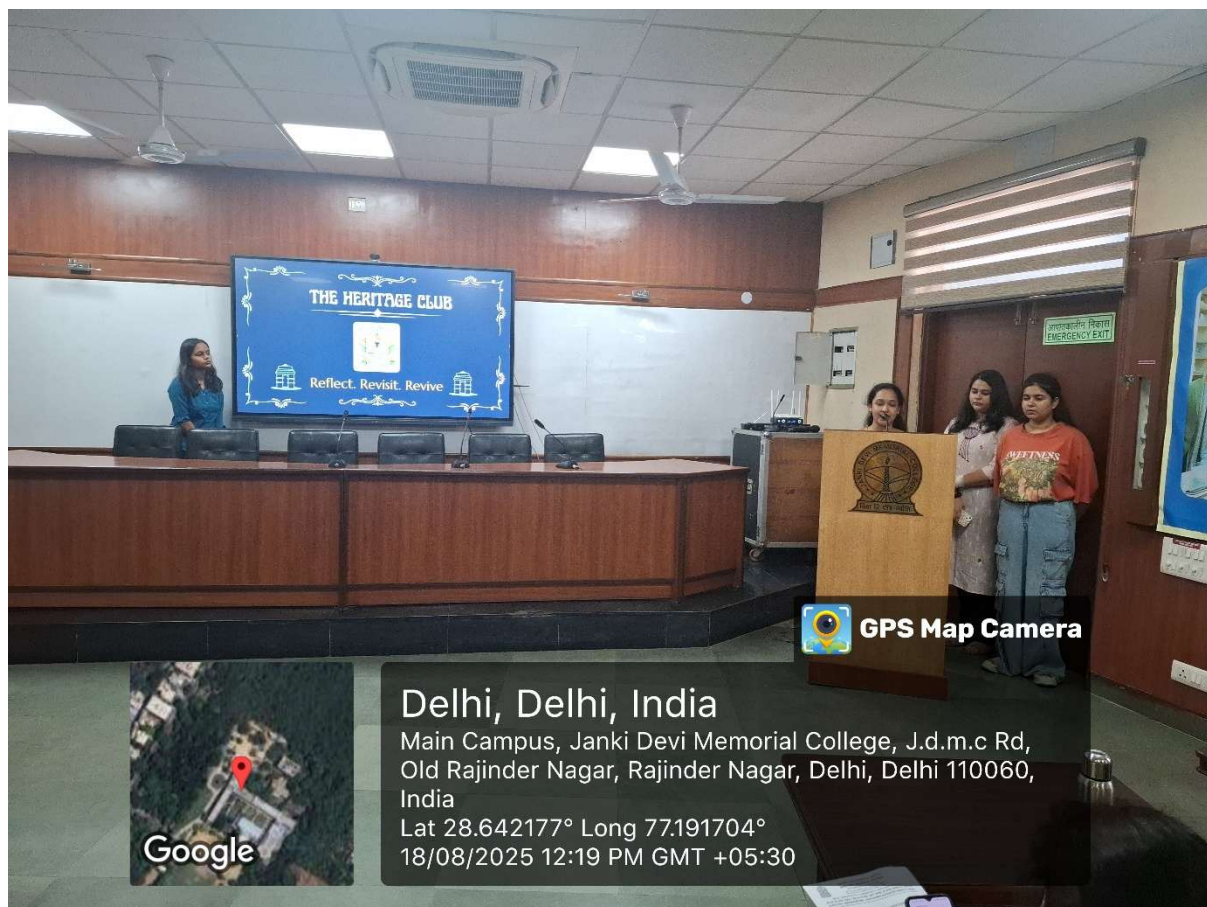
